

#### March 3, 2019

#### International

#### April 2 – World Autism Day

World Autism Awareness Day is an internationally recognized day on 2 April every year, encouraging Member States of the United Nations to take measures to raise awareness about people with Autism Spectrum Disorder throughout the world. It was designated by the United Nations General Assembly resolution "62/139. Light it up blue is a method to draw attention to people living with autism. Autism-friendly events and educational activities take place all month to increase understanding and acceptance and foster worldwide support.

Autism spectrum disorder (ASD), more commonly referred to as autism, is a disorder with a variety of conditions that challenge the individual's social skills, verbal and written communication, and repetitive behaviors. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) estimates one out of every sixty-eight

children within the United States is autistic. However, autism is more common in boys than in girls, affecting one out of every forty-two boys, and one out of every one hundred eighty-nine girls. The signs and symptoms of autism become most evident between the ages of two and three, but some cases have seen patients diagnosed as early as eighteen months old.

If you wish to help call attention to Autism and the need to understand and help people cope with autism, add blue lighting to your home or business during the month of April. There is also Autism Speaks merchandise you can purchase on line.

\*\*I would like to do a service project for Operation Smile, one of our International

Partnerships. Operation Smile repairs cleft palates and cleft lips at a cost of \$240 per surgery. They operate around the world. From April - June, I would like to ask the club to help make and put together 6 - 12 Smile Bags. I will have directions for making the bags at the meeting.

## Smile Bags

After receiving surgery, each child receives a Smile Bag, the perfect gift to cheer up a healing child. Smile Bags are filled with small personal care items as well as toys, stickers and a mirror to see their new smile. We need community volunteers to collect the personal care items and sew cloth Smile Bags.

Operation Smile is in need of the following items to include in a patient's Smile Bag:

Smile Bags are 14"H by 12"W, made of sturdy cotton fabric and are closed by a drawstring at the top. The bag is sized to hold a thin, 8.5" x 11" coloring book. Each bag should include the following:

- Small shampoo (.85 to 1.4 oz size, screw-on top only)
- Small comb (no rat tails)
- New wash cloth
- Bar of soap (small hotel size)
- Travel-sized toothpaste (at least 6 months from expiration date)
- Child-sized toothbrush (single package)
- Small stuffed animal (Beanie Baby<sup>®</sup> size)
- 8-pack box of non-toxic crayons
- Thin 8.5" x 11" coloring book
- Small square mirror (approximate size 3"x 3")

Please do not send personal hygiene items such as dental floss, body lotion, and baby oil. Additionally, we will not accept large personal hygiene items considering the volume of items we will need to ship to a medical mission site. We will not accept any type of food product, like candy and gum; shipping regulations prohibit sending food items across international borders.

I've also talked with new public information person with Morris Fire Protection about getting File for Life items to put in the Super Hero Fun Run bags and hand out at the fun run. She is going to get back to me Monday 4/1 on how many they can donate.

#### **Emergency Contact Database Driver Services**

#### http://www.cyberdriveillinois.com/departments/drivers/ECD/home.html

If you are an Illinois resident and hold an Illinois driver's license, instruction permit and/or identification card, you are eligible to register your emergency contact information.

The Emergency Contact Database allows you to voluntarily enter one or two individuals to serve as your emergency contacts in the event you are involved in a traffic crash or have a medical emergency where you cannot communicate directly with law enforcement or emergency responders. The Emergency Contact Database also allows you to enter basic medical information such as disabilities, medical conditions or special needs (i.e., drug allergies or taking certain prescription medication).

Your emergency contacts do not have to be Illinois residents.

In the event of an emergency situation, only law enforcement will have access to this information and can reach out to your emergency contacts on your behalf.

The Emergency Contact Database also allows you to modify your contact information. You can change the name, address, phone numbers or delete contacts at your convenience.

Once you have submitted your emergency contact information, we encourage you to print a copy of the information and keep it in a safe location with your other important documents such as your passport and credit card information. You are also encouraged to share copies with the individual(s) you name as your emergency contacts so they will know you have listed them.

It is the user's responsibility to enter accurate data into the required fields, as well as to update contact data if necessary. The Secretary of State's office assumes no responsibility for the accuracy of the data entered by the holder of a driver's license (including commercial driver's license), instruction permit, temporary visitor's driver's license and/or identification card and disclaims any liability for damages, costs, and/or expenses, including, without limitation, consequential damages, arising or resulting from any inaccurate data or failure to update contact data.
