

February 11—International Day of Women and Girls in Science

"We need to encourage and support girls and women achieve their full potential as scientific researchers and innovators." — UN Secretary-General, António Guterres

Science and gender equality are both vital for the achievement of the internationally agreed development goals, including the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. Over the past 15 years, the global community has made a lot of effort in inspiring and engaging women and girls in science. Unfortunately, women and girls continued to be excluded from participating fully in science. According to a study conducted in 14 countries, the probability for female students of graduating with a Bachelor's degree, Master's degree and Doctor's degree in science-related field are 18%, 8% and 2% respectively, while the percentages of male students are 37%, 18% and 6%.

In order to achieve full and equal access to and participation in science for women and girls, and further achieve gender equality and the empowerment of women and girls, the United Nations General Assembly adopted <u>resolution A/RES/70/212</u> declaring 11 February as the <u>International Day of Women and Girls in Science</u>.

Feb. 11th & 12th will be the fourth International Day of Women and Girls in Science Forum. It will be held at the United Nations Headquarters in New York. This is one of the flagship events of the UN and a key event for women and girls in science, science experts, policy-makers and diplomats to gather and share their visions, expertise and best practices to bring about more equality in science.

PUBLIC ISSUES

Emergency ID Cards/Decals

Idea: Create Decals to place in the window of homes or vehicles to indicate emergency information is available in a specific location.

Discussed idea with Tracy Steffes, Fire Chief for Morris Fire Dept. & Ambulance District. He provided me with several "File of Life" packets the fire dept. gives out at fairs, expos, etc.

He suggested we encourage residents to use these items and provide educational meetings on different items that are useful to first responders such as: Phones (emergency info) and Apps to keep up to date on weather alerts.

IDOT had a "Yellow Dot" program, see attached press release from 2015, Used to provide information on drivers to first responders. Upon looking into the program I found several articles that it has been discontinued and residents are encouraged to sign up for the IL Sec of State Emergency Contact Data base (see below).

IDOT Cancels Yellow Dot Program

The Illinois Department of Transportation is discontinuing its Yellow Dot program. The Yellow Dot Program aimed to help emergency medical responders by having citizens who signed up for the program provide important medical information that could help in the case of an accident. Participants would fill out a card that would be placed in the glovebox as well as place a yellow dot sticker on their back windshield. No reason was given for the cancellation.

IDOT does encourage all motorists to sign up for the Illinois Secretary of State's Emergency Contact Database. The service allows citizens to enter emergency contact information as well as any disability or special needs information into a voluntary and secure database for no charge. This information can be accessed by law enforcement in cases where people involved in accidents cannot communicate so law enforcement can contact your emergency contacts and be provided with any helpful medical information on scene.

On Tuesday evening, February 5th,the Grundy County Amateur Radio Club, (GCARC) is hosting a guest speaker from the University of Chicago who will talk to us about the Parker Solar Probe. The Parker Solar Probe is orbiting the sun very closely and monitoring the sun in a fashion that we all might find interesting. So we thought it would be nice to invite nearby HAM Radio Clubs and High School Science clubs to the presentation.

The presentation will be in the basement of the Morris public library. Time will be 1800 hrs. to 1930 hrs.

"NASA's historic Parker Solar Probe (PSP) mission will revolutionize our understanding of the Sun. PSP will swoop closer to the Sun's surface than any spacecraft before it, facing brutal heat and radiation conditions. The spacecraft will come as close as 3.83 million miles (and 6.16 million kilometers) to the Sun, well within the orbit of Mercury and more than seven times closer than any spacecraft has come before. To perform these unprecedented investigations, the spacecraft and instruments will be protected from the Sun's heat by a 4.5-inch-thick (11.43 cm) carbon-composite shield, which will need to withstand temperatures outside the spacecraft that reach nearly 2,500 degrees Fahrenheit (1,377 degrees Celsius). "

One Yellow Dot Can Make Life or Death Difference

IDOT signs up participants at state fair for program that helps first responders

SPRINGFIELD – The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT), Illinois State Police, first responders and members of the medical community today showcased the benefits of the Illinois Yellow Dot program and signed up new participants on Senior Day at the Illinois State Fair.

"This simple, but effective program truly is a lifesaver," said Illinois Transportation Secretary Randy Blankenhorn. "The 'golden hour' after a crash is crucial. The information the Yellow Dot program provides can mean the difference between life and death for someone who is injured."

Launched in Illinois in 2011, the program is simple enough. Participants place a circular yellow sticker on the lower left corner of the driver's side rear window of their vehicles and fill out a card to place in their glove box. On the card is vital personal information that assists first responders in providing the best care for victims in the event of a crash. The information provided on the cards also helps hospital staff make critical decisions in determining the types of medications and treatment to administer.

Information on the card includes: the participant's name, a photo, medical conditions, recent surgeries, current medications, allergies, physician information and emergency contact information.

"ISP troopers are oftentimes the first emergency personnel to arrive on scenes where medical attention is needed," said Illinois State Police Col. Michael Zerbonia. "The Yellow Dot can provide troopers with critical medical information to help save a life."

For Senior Day at the fair, IDOT offered fairgoers Yellow Dot stickers, personal information cards and use of a photo booth so they could take part in the program.

"Minutes matter when providing emergency medical care for car crash victims," said Illinois Department of Public Health Director Nirav D. Shah, M.D., J.D. "Having a person's medical information, especially prescription information, can help emergency responders determine what treatment to start and avoid potentially dangerous drug interactions."

Since its inception, thousands of people have signed up for the Illinois Yellow Dot program, which has been featured in the Governors Highway Safety Association's <u>State Highway Safety</u> Showcase.


"We encourage all older drivers to participate in this unique program," said Illinois Department on Aging Acting Director Jennifer Reif. "The Yellow Dot program serves as an opportunity to update medical information which can help victims who may not be able to communicate with first responders in the event of an accident."

Grundy organization makes weighted blankets for kids

MORRIS - Eliyah Ştefanski and her mother, Kymberlie, drove to Morris from DuPage County on a rainy Saturday to sew blankets that will be donated to children with autism or sensory disorders.

Eliyah said this project gave her an excuse to sew, volunteer, feel useful and experience what it means to get behind an organization that helps youth just like

her.
"These blankets actually help me sleep," Eliyah said. "I used to put six blankets on me and I would overheat and wake up, but I needed the weight of all of the blankets to sleep. With this weighted blanket, I don't have to layer up to get comfy and that helps me sleep."

On Dec. 1, members of the General Federation of Women's Clubs in Morris, community volunteers and volunteers with Weighted Comfort for Kids met at 520 W. Illinois Ave. to sew and fill weighted blankets that will be donated to children from ages 2 to 18 who qualify with an autism spectrum disorder or sensory processing disorder diagnosis.

Weighted Comfort for Kids began by two sisters in Dwight named Katie Kinzler and Liz Depew. Kinzler said a friend tried to win a weighted blanket at a fundraiser and she decided to use her skills to sewing a blanket as a gift for the child of this friend. She said she began to talk about the need and the nonprofit began in July 2015.

Two years ago, GFWC-IL Morris Woman's Club member Mary Lee Howard heard about Weighted Comfort for Kids when she attended a spaghetti dinner fundraiser.

Howard said she has been involved in children's organizations all of her life, so when she went to contribute, she fell in love with the organization. She brought the idea to the women's club to hold a sewing event once a month and it has been going strong since that time.

"We are a service organization and we give back to the community, state and internationally," Howard said. During the past six events, the

GFWC-IL Morris Woman's Club monthly sewing group has produced 52 blankets, nine in November alone.

An average of 8 to 10 people show up to volunteer their sewing time for a threehour block and can either sew or fill then blankets with the polypropylene pellets which make the blankets weighted.

The type of fill allows the blankets to be washable and Kinzler said not all of

them available in stores and online have washable fill.

Howard said the service project was open to anyone who wanted to donate time to sew.

"This is an ideal project for kids who need service hours. If someone can sew a straight line, they are welcome and we also teach people how to sew," he said.

The recipients of the weighted blankets are derived from the Weighted Comfort for Kids organization.

Each blanket will be individually tailored to the size and weight of the child and whether they need a full blanket or lap pad. Because of high demand, children are almost two years out for blanket place-

If one were to buy a weighted blanket online, which have increased in popularity, it could run \$100 to \$400 depending upon its size and type of fill.

Weighted Comfort for Kids runs solely on financial donations to purchase fabric, fill and supplies and once the supplies

have been purchased, can only make as many blankets as volunteers can sew.

Kinzler said two groups currently offer sewing groups and she would like to see more created to fill the demands.

We always had high expectations, but we have seen our Facebook page grow by hundreds over the past few months and the need has become greater. We can now guarantee to have 20 blankets made per month," Kinzler said.

Some recipients have shared benefits of the weighed blankets to Kinzler. She said some children have been able to reduce the amount of sleep medications or be able to sleep through the night, calm down, stop meltdowns, relieve anxious behavior and more.

Kymberlie said she has two children who qualified for weighed blankets and while one has a sensory issue that creates a barrier to using the blanket and will take time to fully benefit, the other, Eliyah, cocoons in hers.

"I heard they calm down anxious or disorganized children, so I thought it was worth a try. For one, it's calming and she wraps herself in it," Kymberlie said of Eliyah.

'We need to learn to support people'

Morris Women's Club learns from grief counselor

MORRIS – Grief counselor Kathy Cherven stood in front of the General Federation of Women's Club's Morris group and held up a quarter. To the group, it was just a quarter with two sides, but Cherven explained how this simple quarter represents our lives:

"When I think of grief and any kind of loss;" Cherven said as she placed the quarter on the top of her hand. "This is how you go through life and everything is great."

She went on to explain that many events can happen in a person's life such as a death, divorce, job loss or illness that can alter ones life and perspective of life to cause a state of grief.

"You go through life, you are healthy, you take care of yourself and then ham, you get a life altering diagnosis. That's the other side of the coin and you can't turn it back over. So when you experience this other side, it can change you," Cherven said.

The GFWC-IL Morris Women's Club holds meetings each month for members and guests of members. President Caroline Cummings said that during those meetings, the group will either have a time of scholarship to learn, a ser-

vice project or a social event.
During the Dec. 3 meeting, member Kalleen Cummings asked Cherven to come and speak about grief. Caroline said the time was a good fit due to the holidays and the group has experienced losses lately and have members who are wrighting.

"This seemed like something to do as a target project for mental health to create awareness; good mental health, how to cope and timely with the holidays;" Caroline said.

Grief can stem from losses such as the death of a loved one, job loss, divorce, miscarriage, financial loss and more. Cherven said we'all grieve in different ways and need a listening ear and those in a supportive role need to stop and

just listen.

"We need to learn how to support people who have any kind of a loss. We are all uncomfortable with it because we don't want anyone to be sad. We want people to be OK." Cherven said.

OK," Cherven said
Cherven said that when
people judge, give advice or
tell others they will be OK and
not listen, the person in grief
will more than likely shut
down. But if one listens, then
the person in grief will usually open up and talk. It's
likely they may tell the same
story over and over, but Cherven said, if that's what they
need to do, that's best for
them.

Many clients have come to Cherven and shared phrases loved ones or friends have said to them and those words have done more damage than good to the person who grieves. She said some terms There is no rule book on what do to and not do, if you love someone show support."

can minimize the grief, make the person feel ashamed, sad, and upset, which can lead them to withdraw and depression.

"There is no rule book on what do to and not do, if you love someone, show support," Cherven said,

During the first stages of grief, Cherven said, it's normal for the person to not sleep or eat well and say comments like "Oh I wish I was with..." "Oh, I woke up today." But, if behaviors not normal such as self-medication with alcohol, drugs, shopping or food to

name a few, angry behaviors, disheveled appearance; and cannot laugh, that could be clinical depression and that may be a time to intervene and ask if they need help or if they want to hurt themselves.

"Make an observation, don't give advice, it's their journey. Say, oh it looks like you are drinking a lot more;" Cherven said.

With the holiday season in full swing, Cherven said grief can rear its ugly head and pop up anywhere; even for those who had a life-altering event years ago. Any type of trigger can cause someone to go back into grief mode. Or; someone may have experienced a current loss and the holidays are the first events without the loved one.

"Take the holidays one breath at a time;" Cherven said

She said some clients have

altered the holiday traditions because the former ones have become too painful, or others embrace the traditions in remembrance. Let the person in grief choose how he or she wants the holidays to play out and listen and follow through without surprises that may send one into depression.

Also, an escape plan could be key to holiday gatherings. She said for everyone to have a Plan A. Plan B and Plan C, and if needed, tell the host that they might leave, but not to be alarmed. Cherven said those in grief should stay away from alcohol and have someone drive them to an event in case of a trigger moment.

Cherven read several quotes and ended with this one by LFW, "No rule book. No time frame. No judgment. Grief is as individual as a fingerprint. Do what is right for your soul."


